Episode #11 – Begin Again

This week's theme is inspired by Brendan Kennelly's poem, *Begin*. The first line is 'Begin again to the summoning birds'. Read his full poem below.

Creative Bursts Challenge 1

Write a list of all the creative things you'd like to do in 2021, for example keep a journal, draw and keep a sketchbook, create a new dance or write a poem, story or a whole book.

Creative Bursts Challenge 2

Write a story or poem starting with the following line:

"Looking back, Evie/Eldrin Elder (you choose or create your own name) was a strange child from day one. For a start ..."

Create a great name for the following characters. Draw and write about them.

A one-eyed dog – for example Popeye Yap

A gentle dragon

A powerful but tiny queen

A purple giant

A robot pencil

Creative Bursts Challenge 4

Snowdrops are one of the first flowers of spring. Their proper name is *Galanthus* which means 'milk flower' in Greek. The 'language of flowers' is an ancient way of communicating



using flowers. In the 'language of flowers' snowdrops mean hope.

Write a poem or story about walking in a forest and seeing snowdrops. Maybe they are magical snowdrops that fill the forest glade with a ghostly white light. Maybe there is someone or something living under the snowdrops. You decide!

Extra Creative Bursts Challenge

Draw or paint your own snowdrops. Elizabeth Corbet Yeats, known as Lolly (1868 to 1940) published a special book all about painting flowers and plants, including snowdrops. On this page she shows how to paint a snowdrop's delicate petals.



Lolly Yeats was a fine artist and art teacher. Together with her sister, Lily she ran her own craft and publishing company called Cuala Industries in the early 20th century. It employed only women and used only Irish materials.

Begin again to the summoning birds
